Fourth Year of the MU Peace Corps Fellows Program Continues to Expand This Fall

It is hard to believe that we are entering the fourth year of the Peace Corps Fellows Program at the University of Missouri with a new group of graduate students on campus.

The fellows had some major accomplishments as they continued to expand their interaction with a wide range of students at both university and grade school levels, and with the general public in the mid-Missouri area. A partial list includes the following:

- 1) Collaboration with MU Department of Geography to develop an educational program to stimulate interest in international cultures;
- 2) Work with the Southern Boone County Learning Garden to integrate the garden experience into school curricula and kitchens;
- 3) Interaction with children and young adults with developmental disabilities to develop cooking abilities;
- 4) Tutor troubled youth through Columbia Builds Youth to earn their

GED; and

- 5) Partner in the development of the "Sharing our World" Program in Columbia to develop a database of area individuals with international experience who can speak on public forums, campus and community panels, and classrooms regarding world issues. Several of the 2009 Fellows have been working on this project throughout the summer.

Three new fellows are arriving on campus for 2010. They are from the western regions of the US, but served in a number of regions around the world.

Michael Greenwell
(School of Social Work – Republic of Macedonia 2007 – 2009)

Michael arrived on campus in May from Arizona. His degrees are in Psychology and Social Work from the University of Utah. He actually began his international experiences prior to entering the Peace Corps in Bulgaria and the Czech Republic. In addition, he

worked with the Youth Health Organization in Botswana on prevention and education about HIV/AIDS.

Michael's work in the Peace Corps was in several different areas. He concentrated on working with a co-op of artists to increase their use of technology, education, and marketing of traditional arts and crafts. Also, he continued his interest in educating the public about sexual and reproductive health issues. Finally, he worked with children and adults with mental disabilities. When Michael arrived on the MU campus he immediately began developing connections with the local community by working with the Department of Public Health and Human Services.

Colleen received her BA degree in Geography from the University of Washington. Her work in Senegal was in environmental

Los Angeles, and a conference at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, to name a few.

National Peace Corps Association Group Leaders Forum Report

Each summer the NPCA holds a meeting of affiliate leaders. We are fortunate that Board Member Frank Yates has been going to Washington, DC to represent our group for the past two years.

The following is an excerpt from the June meeting report:

50th Anniversary

Anne Baker, Vice President of NPCA, stated that the celebration “belongs” to everyone – PC; NPCA; member groups; etc. However, it will drive NPCA’s agenda over the next 18 months.

To inform and coordinate the multiplicity of events, NPCA will maintain a master calendar online. As for events coordinated by Peace Corps itself, Peace Corps will

(only) announce those events for which contractual agreements have been signed, but expects the full slate of dates and events to be posted by the end of September.

The official kickoff will be October 13-14, 2010 at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, with students planning an event to take place at 2 a.m., exactly 50 years after President Kennedy challenged students to serve overseas. March 1 (2011), customarily viewed as the birthday of the PC, will involve house parties (on the model used by the MorePC campaign) around the world.

Also planned is an event on March 5, 2011 at the JFK Library in Boston, coordinated by PC, and a summer festival will be held in Boston.

Just announced Thursday is the inclusion of PC as one of 3 major themes of the 2011 Smithsonian Institution’s Folklife Festival on the Washington, DC Mall, between June 30 and July 11.

The other main events in Washington, DC will be held September 22-25, 2011. Generally, they will include an advocacy day (Thursday); a community service day (Friday); country of service activities (open for Saturday); a reception, symposium on the future of PC and a gala (Saturday evening); gathering at Arlington Cemetery and noontime march of flags across the Memorial Bridge (both organized by RPCV/W) to an event on the Mall (Sunday).

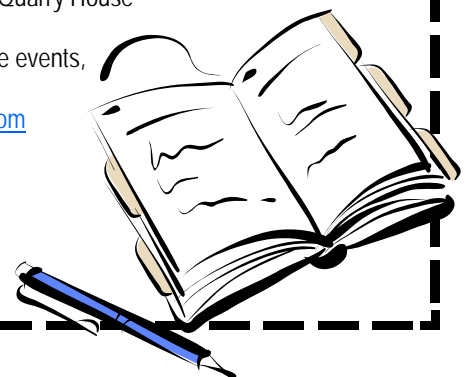

Things are moving along well with the Paraguay Library Project. With the money the Central MO RPCVs donated, we were able to ship 300 books from the US. We also received a grant from USAID to help complete the project.

So far we have a book shelf, desk, and over 300 books! The local carpenter is making the table and chairs for the library. We have been waiting for bars to be put on the window and doors before we buy the computers for security

reasons, which the guys are working on tonight as I type this letter, so looks like we will be getting the computers this week.

We still have many books to buy in the coming months. Also, we have started a

world map project with the local teenagers. They are helping draw a world map on the wall of the library. We just started but it is moving along nicely. We are using a grid to draw the map.

There is a lot of work to be done to prepare the Library. A young boy named Ignacio has been helping us label the books and stamp them. We are unsure of the opening day but I will keep you posted. Thank you all again for your donations and for you support in this project.

A Note from the Field — Condom Education in Cameroon

The country: Cameroon.
The village: Adoumri.
The problem: no condoms.

This nicely sums up the justification for my project funded by the Central Missouri RCPV's earlier this year.

The project's aim is to construct a permanent market boutique for local trained health workers to give condom demonstrations, distribute educational information regarding reproductive health, and make

condoms available at a locally affordable price to the community.

After mounting numerous bureaucratic hurdles, this project is finally underway. A bench and table have been purchased for the

stall and construction of the 6 ft by 9 ft market boutique is almost complete.

Next month, community health mobilizers in the area will assemble for a brief training on correct condom usage and the importance of condoms in the fight against HIV/AIDS. As there is no current government strategy actively at work in Adoumri and condoms are not readily available and remain somewhat taboo, this project stands to make a dramatic, long-term impact in the community.

Outside of NPCA, a reunion for former PC staff (Friday evening) is also being organized.

NPCA's New Look

NPCA has unveiled a “new look,” including a new NPCA logo, tagline, and an improved Web platform for communication. Previously, NPCA had several different websites, each with a different look and branding, which did not show NPCA in its best light.

By bringing all of the disparate sites together, streamlining the content, unifying the “look” and focusing the message about why people should join the national Returned Peace Corps Volunteer community, NPCA believes that the new site will be significantly easier to use and compelling to prospective members. In addition, all information pertaining to the 50th Anniversary will be consolidated onto one website. The 50th Anniversary website will launch in August.

New Membership Options

Out of 200,000 RPCVs, NPCA currently has only 4,700 paid members, while 18,000 subscribe to the e-newsletter and over 20,000 are registered on NPCA's website. To generate more commitment within the community and attract more new (paid) members, NPCA's Board approved a new membership structure and two new NPCA membership options which member groups can also choose to adopt or not. (To date, 33 member groups have chosen to adopt these new options including the Central MO RPCVs.)

First, any RPCV who has never been a member of NPCA is now eligible for a free, one-year membership. Second, any currently serving PCV can activate a free membership for two years, by registering online from the field. (Recently returned PCVs will continue to be eligible to receive the free year of membership upon completing their service.)

A new category for engagement in the NPCA

community has been created – Associate – for individuals who create profiles on the PC Connect social network, representing a demonstrated interest, sufficient to have an (unpaid) affiliation with NPCA. Not being members, Associates cannot vote in NPCA elections or have other rights of membership, according to NPCA's bylaws. However, information obtained from the profiles can be used by NPCA to promote more active engagement, including paid membership.

By these changes, NPCA hopes to take advantage of the increased interest among RPCVs to be generated by the 50th anniversary and convert these persons into paid members. The other two levels of engagement in NPCA remain the same – paid members (at \$35) and Director's Circle (\$1,000 minimum or equivalent in-kind expertise).

SHARING THE WORLD WITH COLUMBIA: Creating international exposure

Global Issues Leadership Development (GILD) and Peace Corps Fellowship are seeking to create a database called *Share the World with Columbia*, to help broaden global exposure in Columbia, MO through access to people who have lived, worked, volunteered, and were born abroad. The database will achieve the following:

- Widen the base of international exposure
- Encourage conversation from a wider base of individuals
- Provide a fresh perspective on human rights in the USA and the world
- Motivate students to become engaged in learning
- Broaden international appeal in our community

Using the database, professors, organizations and other community members planning educational events

will be able to select what type of experience they would like to convey to students. If a lesson is being taught on Latin American culture, for instance, there may be people in the database who were born in Peru or did business in Ecuador who would be available to come speak about their experiences.

We will use the database to invite speakers to small and large events. The small events consist of quarterly brown bag series discussing international issues that are current and relevant to students' interests.

The International Center could also use it to connect students getting ready to go abroad

with those who have already been to the country, or the College of Business could host people who have worked in international business to speak to their classes.

By bringing in new perspectives to the classroom and to the community, individuals with international experiences will present new opportunities to their listeners.

Students will be encouraged to seek out study abroad opportunities, internships that help train them better for the jobs they want, and lead them to pursue higher levels of education. In addition, the presence of people who have volunteered abroad will increase volunteering outlets during semester break and after graduation.

Bringing these world perspectives to Columbia will help students think outside the city, outside the Midwest, and outside of the United States.

education. There she worked with local primary school teachers in the village of Gamadji Saare on discussing critical issues of the environment in the classroom. She was also involved in nutritional tree-plantings, HIV/AIDS testing events, and education on reduction of problems associated with mosquitoes.

A large component of her educational activities was the construction of health murals in medical facilities and schools in the area. Colleen was involved in training new

Peace Corps volunteers in mural construction, with themes that included health education, environmental awareness, and the development of small businesses to ensure a continuation of the work that she began in Senegal.

Joseph Neville
(Geography – Guatemala 2006 – 2008)

Joseph received a BS degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Washington. As a Peace Corps volunteer in Guatemala he served as an ecotourism specialist. He worked with the Defenders of Nature Foundation to manage the Guatemalan

National Forest – Sierra de las Minas, and provide environmental education and assistance in the production of income generating projects.

One of his specific projects was to work with coffee and cardamom farmers to improve their businesses. In addition, he assisted with the development of a biological corridor adjacent to Sierra de las Minas that will increase biological habitats in the area.
