

ORGANIZATIONAL UPDATES

COVID-19 PANDEMIC

The COVID-19 pandemic had a major impact on the Peace Corps program, as all volunteers were quickly evacuated from site in March/April of 2020. This was devastating for those volunteers. The Central MO RPCVs quickly responded by reaching out to volunteers from Missouri to offer our support. We were able to connect with several evacuated PCVs and connect them to mental health supports and offer solidarity. A panel was organized by Whitney Cravens, who also joined our Board this past year. Peace Corps is hopeful to continue programming in early 2022, and we look forward to supporting our PCVs once again!

In light of the pandemic, the Central MO RPCVs also had to adapt and we moved nearly of our programing to virtual formats. As we followed our city/county health official's guidance, we were able to enjoy a few in-person activities - Loaves & Fishes and Adopt-a-Spot - wearing masks and at a safe distance, of course! We hope to resume more in-person programming in later 2021, following the guidance of health officials.

COMMITMENT TO RACIAL EQUITY


In May 2020 the United States witnessed the murder of George Flyod, a Minneapolis man who died at the hands of police. The Central MO RPCVs put out a statement of solidarity with our Black, indigenous, and communities of color (BIPOC) in the United States. In this statement we highlighted the ways in which our organization could promote the beauty of racial/ethnic diversity and address racial inequity within own communities here in Central Missouri. With this, several of our efforts this past year focused on voter engagement and supporting local organizations/businesses that promote the BIPOC community. 
GOODBYE TO MEMBERSHIP DUES!






As the COVID-19 pandemic limited our ability to gather, we had far less expenses this fiscal year. In addition, while we typically make multiple grants to PCV projects, we weren't able to do that either. Instead, the Board focused on setting priority areas for this year and invested in our 3rd Goal Film Series and Loaves & Fishes. Our two fundraising endeavors, Trivia Night and the calendar sales, yielded us over \$900 in profit that we will stash away until the right community project or PCV grant presents itself. The organization is in great fiscal shape.

ADVOCACY



In June 2020, Pat Westhoff and Frank Yates participated in a virtual call with other RPCV groups around the country to discuss the murder of George Floyd, and how individual groups can promote a call to action. The Board crafted a statement in response, with concrete details of how the organization will promote our local communities of color.

In August 2020, Frank Yates and Don Spiers attended the National Peace Corps Association (NPCA) virtual meeting to discuss the future of Peace Corps.

This past year, our group partnered with the Kansas City and St. Louis RPCV groups to engage in legislative advocacy. On two occasions, members of all three groups met with representatives from Senator Blunt's office to discuss Peace Corps funding, legislation for mental health services for Evacuated RPCVs, and extended health care support for RPCVs. We will continue partnering with both groups to advocate for the future of the Peace Corps, volunteers, and PCVs.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Adopt-a-Spot

Don Spiers continutes to coordinate our Adopt-a-Spot volunteer efforts. For those of you who are not aware, our group is responsible for a stretch of Elm Street in downtown Columbia. This past year, we have had a steady turnout of regular volunteers to pick up trash on four separate occasions. As we remained socially distanced and wearing masks, it was nice to have human interaction during times in which everything else around us stood still. As always, thank you to Don for your commitment to our community and coordinating this volunteer effort!







Loaves & Fishes

Ashlee Christiansen coordinates our Loaves & Fishes meal, which is served on the 5th Friday of each month in which there are five Fridays (7/31, 10/30, 1/29, and 4/30). It is hosted at the Wilkes Blvd United Methodist Church. The City of Columbia took over operation of the Loaves & Fishes meal for several months due to the pandemic, however RPCV volunteers were needed to serve to-go meals during those times. About 90 meals were served each date, which culminated into approximately 30 service hours per date (150 hours total). Ashlee, thank you for all of your efforts this year!

Tiger Pantry Food Drive

In October, our organization partnered with the MU School of Social Work and Tiger Pantry to help restock the shelves for students in need of extra food supplies. Sarah Rielley, who is a member of our group and the faculty coordinator for Tiger Pantry initiated this partnership. We collected food for two weeks and held a drive through food donation event towards the end of the month. Volunteers at the food drive showed up in Halloween costumes and 451 pounds





of food were collected!

Voter Engagement

Erin Robinson, Jenifer Pilz, and members of our group worked to get out the vote this past fall as the 2020 elections were upon us. The organization parternered with the League of Women Voters to provide various volunteer opportunities. We appreciate everyone's efforts to help promote voter engagement in our communities!

Community Partnerships

Steve Olson has been in touch with local organizations and schools this past year, to help maintain our community partnerships. Steve pitched the idea of creating a World Map Mural with a few of these groups, which he received enthusiastic responses. We hope to get planning underway for this project this summer! Steve donated several 2020 calendars to local high school language departments. He provided them with information about our group in hopes of developing more outreach opportunities in the future. FUNDRAISING

Our two main fundraiser events, the Annual World Trivia Night and the International Calendar sales, raised over \$900 for the organization. Trivia Night was held virtually in October and nearly 30 people participated. It was a fun night, and Team Infinitesimal won the royal trivia crowns! A lot of laughs were shared all night. Thank you to Jeremy Winter who created the trivia questions and acted as the emcee for the night!

We were happy to continue our tradition of selling the beautiful international calendars produced by the Wisconsin-Madison RPCV group. With some extra effort, we sold nearly all of the 100 calendars that we ordered. Pat Westhoff volunteered his time to help promote calendar sales, thank you to Pat!



The panel illustrated how leaving experiences differed between countries. For some, it was more chaotic than others. Some EPCVs spoke about the complications with closed borders and cancelled flights. Leaving also differed by how much advance notice people had to pack and say goodbye. There were good questions and engagement from the audience.

The Board voted to support a project of an EPCV from Missouri, but the project was fully funded before the approval was finalized.

Peace Corps Week

The Board provided \$300 dollars toward the virtual screening of Mediterranea in April 2020. The film details the lives of two friends who immigrated from Burkina Faso to Italy. Grace Oyenubi, a Nigerian journalist who has covered the migration of Africans to Europe introduced the film and RPCVs from Burkina Faso were invited to serve on a guest panel. A total of 29 people attended this virtual event.

We look forward to continuing the legacy of the 3rd Goal Film Festival with this film series format, and will continue to sponsor and co-sponsor events throughout the year!

RPCV SPOTLIGHT

Jeremy Winter & Ginny Ramseyer Winter Turkmenistan, 2005-2006







Jeremy and Ginny served in Dashoguz, Turkmenistan from 2005-2006. Jeremy served as a teacher, and Ginny served as a health educator. In this photo, they are standing near the site of the ancient town of Ürgenç, which contains the ruins of the capital of Khwarazm, a part of the Achaemenid Empire. When asked to describe their service, Jeremy and Ginny responded:

"During our service in Turkmenistan, we had wonderful opportunities working with students! Through teaching English at a local elementary school, dispelling health myths at The American Corner, interactions with locals, and exploring this former Soviet state, we were able to provide and gain a richer understanding of our respective cultures. We provided resources for international scholarships, standardized testing preparation, and learned so much about resourcefulness and patriotism!"

RPCV SPOTLIGHT

Whitney Cravens Ukraine, 2018-2020



Q: What is one of your most memorable Peace Corps experiences? One of my most memorable Peace Corps experiences is when I first went to the "banya", or sauna, with my host family! My fellow PCV and I were terrified at not knowing the cultural expectations, but it ended up being a really fun experience and now I love the banya and laugh about it with my host family every time we remember. Also, riding my first train to site with my counterpart and not knowing what lay ahead there was so much uncertainty and yet it grew me tremendously.

Q: How did the Peace Corps evacuation affect your life and service?

It changed my life and service completely! I used to watch the videos of other PCVs in Ukraine getting evacuated in 2014 because of Euromaidan, and I just thought "wow that's so sad and horrible" and then it happened to me over a period of just a couple of days that my life got completely turned upside down - I lost my job, moved countries and apartments, and left my community, church, and colleagues behind overnight. Now I understand that God had a plan through it all and it was the right timing for my service to end and for me to come back home for the time being. Nonetheless, it was a really challenging transition and it will always have an impact on my life.

Q: How has Peace Corps influenced your post-service life?

Serving in the Peace Corps affirmed that I wanted to spend my life serving others, especially in the cross-cultural context, and I realized when I was serving in Ukraine that God had called me to be a missionary there. I continue to work towards going back to live and serve in Ukraine long-term with the local church, and I am grateful to Peace Corps for helping to prepare me and lead me down the path that I am on now.

Q: What's a distinctive tradition from your host country?

Ukrainians love to eat salo at holidays, which is cured pork fat, and also holodetz - essentially gelatin with meat bones in them. I could enjoy salo if prepared properly, but I wouldn't go near holodetz!
